All students admitted to the college must also meet the quantitative reasoning requirement, designed to ensure that every graduate receives a certain level of proficiency in using and analyzing quantitative information. To graduate, students must complete 120 to 128 semester hours, including 24 to 30 in a major field, with a minimum GPA of 2.0.
